

Stoco High School Awarded State Boxing Title By Commission

Recognition Is Announced By Dr. Ward Wylie

Argument Over What Team Is Entitled To State Championship Is Concluded By Decision

Dr. Ward Wylie, chairman of the State Athletic Commission, informed authorities at Stoco High school of Lego, Friday night, that the Stoco boxing team had been formally recognized as high school champions of West Virginia.

The decision was reached after a formal claim had been read before the Commission and after a review had been made of the seasons records of the Lego school and other claimants to the state high school title.

The announcement brought to a close one of the most successful boxing seasons ever enjoyed by a West Virginia school. Some thirty high schools in the state conducted schedules in the ring pastime. Favorable reports were heard on every hand of it as a scholastic sport. Not one major injury was reported throughout the state.

The new state champions are coached by W. R. Stephens, former Big Ten welter champ from the University of Michigan. Stephens is assisted by Willis Gunnoe, a former Concord College man. Charles Burdiss was team manager and official second throughout the championship season.

Boxing Started In 1931
Boxing started at the Raleigh county school four years ago when Coach Stephens was first employed. Team matches were not fought until the next year however. Last year the Stoco mittmen won the Stoco Invitational Tourney.

This year the Indian fighters took part in two tournaments. The Southern West Virginia Tourney at Fayetteville was won by the Stoco team and two Stoco men entered the finals in the South Atlantic Prep School Tourney at Staunton, Virginia.

The squad members were: James Hurt, James Meadows, Joe Tolliver, John W. Peters Jr., W. B. Morefield, Jr., Lenwood Hampton, Herbert Clark, Charles Shafer, Marvin Clade, Joseph H. Peters, Levi Worley, William Atkinson, Oscar Smith, Otis Harvey, Glen Bedwell, Dallas T. England, Jr., Harlan Groah, and Pete Bell.

Of the present team only Worley and Harvey will graduate. Herbert Clark is a Junior and the remainder of the squad are sophomores and freshmen.

James Hurt 85, Atkinson 135 and Bedwell 155, are Southern State champions. Bedwell and Joseph H. Peters were South Atlantic Prep School finalists. Atkinson has not been defeated this season in state competition.

Lost But Two Meets
Stoco defeated Richwood, Mount Hope, Gauley Bridge, Fayetteville, Montcoal and Colcord during the past season and lost hairline meets to Richwood and Mount Hope.

According to popular opinion much of the credit for the rapid rise of the Stoco mittmen to state prominence is due Coach W. R. Stephens, whose record both as a fighter and as a teacher is loudly acclaimed by Stonecoal fans. Starting four years ago with only willing workers Stephens has accomplished the near-impossible feat of taking a state championship to a smaller high school.

Wylie Makes Announcement

Fin, Feather And Fur

The following list of recommended trout streams in three counties is based upon the local knowledge and recommendations of game wardens and sportsmen. The list does not include all of the open trout streams of the state, possibly some streams not included will yield more satisfactory results than those listed.

Our trout streams have not yet fully recovered from the effects of drought in the summers of 1930 and 1931. The Conservation Commission placed nearly two million fingerling trout in streams throughout the state during the year 1934, and expects to exceed this number during the current year, however it is not anticipated that the stocking of 1934 has materially increased the number of legal sized trout available at this time and the commission cannot guarantee results in any stream of the state, listed or unlisted. We wish trout fishermen fun and fish, and all fishermen are requested to use the utmost care in releasing and returning undersized fish.

Information and suggestions (by game protectors) concerning trout fishing for the 1935 season:

Nicholas County
Cranberry River—20 or 25 miles of fishing water open. Some accommodations—good roads—good camp sites but no buildings along stream. Brook and rainbow fishing fair.

South Fork of Cherry—main stream and several good tributaries, namely, Big Rocky, Becks Run and Cold Knob Rock. Rather inaccessible, but the best in the county. Bad road but can be traveled in car. Good camp sites but no buildings or accommodations.

North Fork of Cherry River—15 miles of main stream—tributaries closed. Good road (ccc) seven miles up—no accommodations.
Big Laurel Creek—12 or 15 miles of fishing but not so good—rough road.
(Permits must be had from government office at Richwood to go over CCC roads and to build fires on their land.)

Webster County
Back Fork of Elk River—rather inaccessible—leave car on top of Point Mountain and walk 1 1/2 miles to fishing waters, carrying tent and supplies.

Gauley River—drive car to Bergo and take motor car to fishing waters—good camping sites but no buildings.
Cranberry River—to Camp Cranberry—consult Captain Calhoun for permit to get in.

Pocahontas County
Main Greenbrier River from Durbin to Boyer. Good rainbow trout fishing. Can stay in Durbin which is near fishing waters.

Elk River—fishing for rainbow fairly good—camp sites available at Slaty Fork—no charge.

East and West Prong of Greenbrier River (brook trout). Camp sites easily available or can stay at Durbin, on East Prong, but rather unhandy on West Prong.
Cranberry River—camp site established at Forks of Cranberry by Forestry Service (brook trout).
William River—(brook and brown trout) camp sites can be established almost anywhere.

Quail and Forest Fires
O. B. Harris, county game protector, announced recently that during the past week fifty quail, and a number of rabbits were released in pairs in various parts of the county.

Three pairs of quail were placed the state game farm at Pinecrest Sanitarium; others at Glen Daniel and near Glen White; some in the Shady Spring section and down on Coal River.
Next winter the quail and rabbits on the game preserve will be trapped and distributed throughout the county simultaneous with placing a new stock there.

However, Harris claimed yesterday morning that the widespread fires now ravaging the county forests are wiping out game faster than it is possible to build up a plentiful assortment, and for that reason, he added, those found to be responsible for the starting of fires will be prosecuted to the full extent of the law.

Yesterday there was a total of twenty forest fires in Raleigh county alone, and the game protector pointed out the duty of the citizens of neighborhoods affected to report any blazes at the earliest possible time so that efforts could be made to stop the advance of the fire before it reached its greatest fury. Fires should be reported to the nearest fire warden if possible; if not then to O. B. Harris, phone 702, Beckley.

Joe Blake, Tams' regular twirler, allowed only one hit in the two frames he pitched, one a triple by Leigon with two out in the eighth.

Columbia And Michigan State Take Lead In Events

Philadelphia, April 27.—Columbia University's flashy speed kings and Michigan State's sturdy distance runners, achieving twin-victory goals while Louisiana State fell short of a similar objective, brought the 41st Pennsylvania Relay Carnival to a smashing conclusion today before a crowd of 30,000 spectators and under perfect weather conditions at historic Franklin Field.

With the benefit of a day's rest between events, Columbia's sprinters added the 890-yard relay championship to the quarter-mile crown, dethroning Cornell in each race, thanks to the brilliant work of Sam Maniaci and Ben Johnson, Negro holder of the National indoor dash title.
